PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Hills Basketball Association has continued to provide opportunities across all sectors of our membership to participate as players, coaches, officials, staff, supporters and volunteers in a year that marked a major milestone as we celebrated our 40th Anniversary. This was a great opportunity to reflect on the successes and achievements of the association and the many individuals who have contributed both day to day and to HBA's long term success and planning, including the visionary step to build and control our main stadium in 1995.



The association has continued to grow, perpetuating this legacy by increasing to nine courts over the past years to support what is the largest membership base in NSW. The growth of the Hills area and popularity of our game means participants are still excluded due to a lack of courts.

The Board is continuing to work on this topic while also strengthening governance and management across a variety of areas including risk management, delegation policy, succession and strategic planning.

I would like to thank recently retired Director, Jaymes Murray for his contribution to HBA over many years. Since the last AGM, we welcomed as Directors, Tracey Hudson, Bronwyn Martin and Sally Ryan. Tracey and Bronwyn filled casual vacancies on the Board and are elected Directors. Sally is an appointed Director with a focus on strategic planning and venue acquisition and enhancement. Michelle Shiers joined the Nominations Committee as a committee member.

I would also like to thank my Board and Board Committee colleagues for their contributions. Particularly, Darrell Anderson who finished up as Company Secretary in December and Olivia Nicholls who has been performing the Company secretary role until Darrell's replacement is able to commence in the position.

Our Board committees continue to mature and evolve, strengthening HBA's ability to achieve considered outcomes across many identified priorities. It was reassuring to see the positive level of community interest in HBA's governance, as was reflected in the significant number and diversity of candidates who applied for the vacant Director and Company Secretary roles.

Our HBA staff and volunteers go above and beyond in their efforts to make HBA a welcoming place for people of all ages and abilities. When you see them at events, please take a moment to thank them.

We look forward to continuing to grow our community, facilities and on-court success.



CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER REPORT

2024 marked a milestone year as Hills Basketball Association celebrated 40 years of delivering opportunities to our local community - and we had much to celebrate. In compiling memorabilia and stories from across four decades, we not only honoured our proud history but also reflected on the growth of Hills Basketball into the multifaceted organisation it is today. This special anniversary year added another chapter to our legacy, particularly through our basketball programs. Any meaningful reflection in this area must begin with the ongoing challenge of limited facility access.

With a waitlist of over 1,000 players across our local competition and Hornets Academy sessions, the demand continues to exceed our capacity. Despite these constraints, the Association implemented creative solutions to grow our reach while maintaining our commitment to quality. Notably, the addition of Bella Vista Public School as a competition venue allowed for expanded U/14 divisions, opening opportunities for an additional one hundred young players. Our special programs also continued to thrive. Hills Basketball remains a state leader in inclusive grassroots participation, incorporating wheelchair basketball, all abilities, and walking basketball - programs that embody our commitment to accessibility and community engagement.

We were again recognised by Basketball NSW in 2024, with awards for our coaching program and the performance of our senior teams in BNSW competitions. Individual accolades also went to Jayna Bonney (Referee of the Year) and Ros Graham (Statistician of the Year). At an even higher level, two Hornets community members were honoured on the 2024 Australia Day Honours List. Trish Nicholls was awarded the Medal of the Order of Australia (OAM) for service to basketball as a statistician, while Lauretta Claus received a Member of the Order of Australia (AM) for significant service to basketball at both national and international levels, and to education. We are incredibly proud to count both as life members of our Association.

Our facilities remained vibrant community hubs in 2024. Across our three venues, we hosted not only basketball, netball, badminton and futsal, but also welcomed floorball, pickleball, trade shows, film shoots, semi-professional wrestling, and even Nerf wars.

We also welcomed new sub-licensees in 2024. A Slice of Jodie began offering freshly baked treats from the Dural Recreation Centre (DRC) kitchen, and Hills Squash joined us to help rejuvenate the squash courts at the same location. While the gym operator at DRC moved on, we are excited to share developments in that space in 2025. Major refurbishment works were completed at Dural, including full replacement of the squash and main court floors. Importantly, 2024 also saw the commencement of discussions with The Hills Shire Council around a potential extended licence at Bernie Mullane Sports Complex. As always, our broader engagement with Council remains focused on achieving our long-term goal: expanded indoor sport facilities to meet the growing needs of our region.

In 2024, we completed the transition from our previous incorporated association to a company limited by guarantee structure. While this change is largely invisible to our members, it brings greater oversight, improved governance, and stronger future proofing for the organisation. Irrespective of these changes, Hills Basketball Association remains proudly not-for-profit and community focused. Behind the scenes, the administrative workload generated by the change – including the implementation of a new accounting system – was immense. Special thanks go to Karen Burke and Lisa Kelly for their outstanding efforts in this transition.

We also welcomed new team members in 2024: Lachy Power (Officials Manager), Bethany Chand (Fred's Café Manager), and Maryanne Overton (Partnerships Manager). Our thanks and best wishes go to Maddie Dunstan, Terry Johnson, Tracey Hudson and Isabella Manieri as they move on to new opportunities.

There were also changes within our Board, as detailed in the President's Report. I would like to extend a personal thank you to outgoing director Jaymes Murray, whose years of volunteer service helped build the solid foundation we stand on today.

Thanks to the collective efforts of our staff and Board, we also recorded an improved financial performance in 2024. While we will always prioritise community outcomes over profit, financial stability ensures we can continue to invest in the long-term future of basketball in the Hills Shire and actively contribute to the health of the sport across NSW.



YEAR IN REVIEW

LOCAL COMPETITION remains the heartbeat of the Association, with over 850 teams competing each season—maintaining our status as the largest local competition in New South Wales.


Oversubscription in several divisions continues to pose challenges due to limited venue availability. To help address this, additional courts at Bella Vista Public School were brought online for the Summer 2024/25 season. This expansion allowed for a modest increase in junior team capacity, particularly within the Under-14 Boys division.



Hills Basketball Association remains committed to reinvesting in the development of local competition, ensuring continued growth and inclusivity. All players have access to Glory League, and free coaching education courses are provided to help raise the standard of grassroots coaching.

Our officials continue to receive consistent training and support, enabling them to cover more than 350 games each week—with over 700 referee shifts rostered from a pool of 243 active referees. Their efforts are complemented by our dedicated Supervisors, who play a vital role in creating a positive and enjoyable environment for all participants.

While female participation has fallen below 30%, this says more about the increase in boys teams than a drop off in girls. The Association remains proactive in seeking new ways to encourage more girls to take up the sport and is actively exploring solutions to expand access.



The **OFFICIALS DEPARTMENT** continues to develop some of the most skilled referees, statisticians, and scoretable officials in Australia. We proudly service the largest local competition in the state, while also providing high-quality officials for Basketball NSW Leagues and school events.

In 2024, we managed a roster of over 240 active referees, facilitated 81 referee upgrades, and supported more than 160 referees through development courses. Our Association was well represented at higher levels, with 47 referees officiating in Junior Representative Leagues and 24 in Senior Representative Leagues, including Wheelchair competitions.



Special thanks to our Statistician Coordinator, Stu Thom, and Scoretable Coordinator, Neil McNaught, for their outstanding support in rostering and developing officials throughout the 2024 Representative season.

The **DEVELOPMENT DEPARTMENT** continues to expand its services, delivering 24 skill sessions per week throughout each school term. In Term 4 of 2024, the team also introduced dedicated All-Abilities sessions, further enhancing program inclusivity.

Through the ongoing development of curriculum and the upskilling of our Hornets Academy coaches, both the Skills Programs and Holiday Camps have earned a strong reputation as leading learn-to-play offerings. With over 5,800 participants in the Hornets Academy program, the Association stands as one of the largest providers of grassroots basketball development in the country.

The Association is also steadily growing its NBL1 program, built around a strong foundation of homegrown Hornets athletes. With increasing support from both the community and business sector, the semi-professional league is evolving each year toward a higher and higher standard. In alignment with our long-term athlete development goals, the Association is set to launch a High Performance Centre in 2025, further strengthening our athlete pathway.



Hills Basketball Association manages, maintains and services the Hills Basketball Stadium, Bernie Mullane Indoor Stadium & outdoor Netball Courts and the Dural Recreation Centre. As per chart below majority of our prime time hours are allocated to our local competition, followed by our Development and Representative programs. With approximately 25% of court availability booked by external users for an array of sports & events.

While many Associations opt to utilise courts for Representative training sessions, HBA continues to hire external courts to support our financial position and therefore maintain a healthy growth of opportunities for grass roots. Balancing community and elite basketball has and will always be balanced at HBA, to ensure the Association has consistent pathways for all levels of basketball.


